The Two Chunk Method

How to improve the commentary of your paragraph.



DEVELOPING YOUR BODY PARAGRAPH



- Concept: the two-chunk paragraph is a method that will help you develop strong evidencebased writing for literary analysis.
- This method provides a structure for you to
 - cite strong evidence
 - explain how you have interpreted the evidence to support your claim

TO REITERATE



 The basic idea is that you state your claim in your topic sentence, prove what you're saying with two "chunks" of information, and then reassert your point in a concluding sentence

BASIC OUTLINE

- <u>Topic sentence (TS)</u> This sentence tells the reader what the main idea of the paragraph is. Typically, you state the claim that you are going to prove. If you are writing a paragraph in response to a question, the topic sentence should answer the question.
- a. <u>Concrete Detail 1</u> (CD1): Specific evidence taken directly from the text, either as a quotation or paraphrase.
- b. Commentary 1 (COM1): This is where you interpret the detail and explain how it supports your claim.
- c. <u>Transition</u> (TR): A phrase or sentence that shows how the two chunks are connected, such as a phrase like "Another example of this..." to transition to a supporting detail or a contrasting transition like "however..."
- d. Concrete Detail 2 (CD2): A second piece of evidence from the text.
- e. Commentary 2 (COM2): As with the first chunk, interpret the detail and explain how it supports your claim.
- <u>Concluding Sentence</u> (CS): "wrap up" the paragraph by reasserting the claim you made in the topic sentence.

COMMENTARY



 Commentary is your explanation of HOW the concrete detail proves your point. This is where "you" get to express yourself. This is where your voice gets heard.
